



Loretto Artist Residency Fall 2022-Spring 2023

"You're invited to do your art in the midst of Loretto hospitality."

Applications due October 10 for first-round consideration.

Applications will be reviewed on an ongoing basis after that date as space is available.

KFW is partnering with the Sisters of Loretto/Loretto Community to offer **Artist Residencies of 1-3 weeks** at the Loretto Motherhouse in Nerinx, Ky.

Residencies are open to feminist artists who are residents of Kentucky who have demonstrated achievement in creating work high in artistic merit and based on social justice issues/concerns.

Scheduling is open for: October 14-May 14

- 1. You can apply for a 1-3 week residency during this timeframe.
- 2. If you have a need for a longer residency, contact KFW
- 3. Any art form can apply: Visual, Literary, Media, Performing

Residents will be provided with housing and the option of studio space, which includes the use of an art studio, tools and equipment. (Resident must already know how to use the equipment; no on-site training will be provided.)

WHO CAN APPLY?

The Loretto Residency Program is open to feminist social change artists who reside in Kentucky. Artists with varied backgrounds, worldviews, cultural heritages, and sexual orientations are encouraged to apply. KFW is committed to making the residency program accessible to a wide range of women regardless of age, race, ethnicity, sexual orientation, educational level, economic condition or geographic origin.

FOOD & HOUSING

The Loretto Motherhouse has a cafeteria where artists can make arrangements for a meal plan if they choose.

KFW will provide a food stipend of \$10/day, to be paid directly to the artist, to offset the cost of food during the residency. Artists will be responsible for the remainder of their food costs, whether taking the meal plan or providing their own food.

The Loretto Motherhouse has two options for accommodations. The online application will provide more information about each housing option. Since Loretto offers a cafeteria, each housing space includes only a small kitchenette with a mini fridge to prepare light meals. (Extensive cooking in these spaces will be difficult).

LORETTO COMMUNITY, AMENITIES and MEDIA

The Loretto Motherhouse offers extensive grounds, including three ponds, for walking, hiking and exploring the natural world as an inspiration for your art while living in community on a campus where 100 people live. The campus includes an artist studio/gallery, a piano in a shared space and the Loretto Heritage Center.

Loretto loves to communicate what is happening within its community. They have an internal TV channel "News from the Hill" on Thursdays. They highly encourage artists in residents to share with the community what they are working on during their residency at Loretto.

Participants will be asked to grant permission for their work to be included if Loretto wishes to use or publish artwork on their website or social media.

COVID, SMOKING AND TRANSPORTATION

Accepted residents will be required to submit a vaccination card showing they have been fully vaccinated, including booster for the COVID-19 virus.

Residents will need to comply with the campus no-smoking policy. The entire campus, including farm and woods, is a no-smoking area.

All residents must provide their own transportation to and from the Motherhouse campus, as well as any supplies, provisions, clothing and outdoor gear for the

duration of their stay. Parking is available, and a hangtag vehicle pass will be provided.

Artists are welcome to come and go as they desire. There is a grocery store 1 mile away, and the campus is only about a 20-minute drive from Bardstown, Springfield, Lebanon and Hodgenville if other needs arise.

Questions you will find on the online application:

- 1. Please describe yourself as an artist. What kind of work do you create? What specifically do you plan to work on during this residency?
- 2. How does your work address social justice concerns or work for peace and justice?
- 3. What are your goals for your residency?
- 4. The Loretto Community cares about accessibility. Please describe any ways you make your work accessible for those with disabilities. (Ex: for literary artists, printing in advance what you will read for d/Deaf, hard of hearing or neurodivergent audience members, or ensuring visual work is accompanied by an audio description, etc. For more info click https://www.aam-us.org/programs/resource-library/deai-education-interpretation/#Accessibility).
- 5. Do you plan to use the artist studio? What tools/equipment might you use?
- 6. Physical/Medical Needs: Do you have physical or medical needs that will affect your stay at Loretto?
- 7. Submit an artist bio.
- 8. Submit a short work sample (3-5 visual images or 4-6 pages of writing).

I felt more connected to the community of sisters knowing their values and focus on social justice and peace. And feeling part of a community drives me to continue the work of being a feminist social change artist.

In so many ways the experience was so healing because I grew up Catholic and as a queer, BIPOC person have some religious trauma from interactions with the church as a kid/ young teenager. Being in this strong, inspiring community of women who are committed and actively doing social justice work was so inspiring and healing for me. I'm so grateful for the experience and the impact it had on my work.

Watching and listening to these women during my time there reminded me to prioritize hope in my writing--because hope is a thing that still exists in places like Loretto.

Being there surrounded by the influence of women who have worked for changes regarding such important social justice issues was truly inspiring. Learning their history at the Heritage Center, spending time exploring the land, and hearing some of their stories was profound. I could fill an entire book with wonder and praise for my time there. They are a shining example of how kind, thoughtful, and productive our world could be if only we cared for one another and the land. I am humbled by this experience, and I still have so much to learn. I am deeply moved by their legacy, and I hope to carry that feeling and my gratitude with me into every project I do going forward. I am ready to be more bold in my own feminist pursuits of social change, and to share the spirit of this community with everyone around me.

Spending a week at Loretto Motherhouse was just what I needed to get deeper into a poetry project I recently started. It was a really productive time of reading writing, and walking, listening to the cows, birding, and occasionally talking to the sisters. All food for a poet's soul, thank you KFW and Sisters of Loretto.

This residency allowed me to slow down, to explore my connection to the world around me- the natural world of bees, bunnies, turtles, ticks, leaves, lakes; the interior world of my being and how it reflects both the beauty and ugliness of our world; the human-created world that too often severs our sense of interconnection with All. I was able to write and reflect, to draw and paint, to dream of the world I want to live in and take steps, even if first only in imagining, to create that more connected, more just, more sustainable world.
